Online updates worth noting

Ancestry – indexes to Irish Poor Law Union removals from England 1859-60: Irish schoolmasters and mistresses 1826: Alien registration cards for Jersey 1920-1953: Wiltshire parish baptisms, marriages and burials - 1538-1916, includes Sir Christopher Wren. www.britishnewspaperarchive.co.uk has now reached about half way through the original proposed digitisation plan, recent additions being The Sportsman, Oswestry Advertiser and the Islington Gazette.

rootsireland.ie – has added records including non-Catholic marriages, census substitutes and graveyard inscriptions for East Galway.

fibis.org – has added 10,000 soldiers from the registers of the Bengal Army European Soldiers 1790-1839 at the India Office. Banknotes – originally these were 'I.O.Us' for gold deposited at the Bank of England. People used the notes to pay for goods and services, safe in the knowledge that they were backed by the 'promise to pay' the equivalent value in gold. The promise still appears on banknotes today.

Don't forget that you can access Lancashire Library non-subs sources, i.e. newspaper records, by using your library bar-code on your own computer. Go to Lancashire Library Digital and you will be requested to log in with your library barcode, you can then search national records.

The State Pension was only introduced on 1st January 1909, meaning that if you find an ancestor on census before that time listed as a pensioner it must have been a private pension. If your ancestor was listed as an 'annuitant' it doesn't mean they were wealthy. Small annuities were awarded by charities such as the UK Benevolent Association who aided the upper and middle classes in temporary distress.
